
Shipmate August 2017 Duke Longworth 30 May 2017

It is once again my sad duty to report the loss of another classmate. **Robert "Bru" Brubaker** passed away Sunday 30 April at Anderson Hospital in Meridian, MS. He arrived in Annapolis following graduation from high school in Bellville, Illinois. A graduating member of the 36th company, he was an avid sportsman involved in a number of club and intramural sports including company softball and volleyball. After receiving his Wings of Gold in 1973, he was assigned as a Jet Flight Instructor at NAS Meridian with the VT-9 Tigers. In 1976, he was transferred to the Panama Canal Zone as the Officer in Charge of the Patrol Boat School. In 1979, he served his final three years on active duty as NAS Meridian. Finally in 1981, Bru began his new career as a flight simulator instructor and retired after 33 years in order to pursue his life-long interest as an avid gun collector. Bob is survived by his wife of 46 years, Paula; brother, William, four children, and four grandchildren. Graveside services were held on Friday, May 5, 2017 at Forest Lawn. May he rest in peace.
