**Michael** "Mike" **Bilecky** passed away in Lima, Peru this April following a yearlong battle with liver cancer. He came to Navy from Silver Spring, MD and was 17 years old Plebe Summer. Mike was an outstanding high school wrestler and was a member of the Plebe wrestling team. A beloved member of 11<sup>th</sup> CO, Mike will be remembered for his contagious smile, and as our classmate who sank his 911 Porsche in Chesapeake Bay beyond the sea wall at USNA our 1<sup>st</sup> Class year. Mike majored in mechanical engineering. He had a brief career as a Naval Officer and later taught the concepts of solar energy at the University of Maryland.
