

Doug was born 22 January 1949 in Dover, New Hampshire. Following high school graduation, he joined us on 28 June 1967. happy days with him in Mother B. He was known for his athleticism and at times one who wore the Superintendent's lists stars as an all-star academic. Doug was a member of the indoor track team, and starred on the 23rd Company's Lightweight Football team leading them to a Regimental Championship in 1970. After graduation, Doug attended the Nuclear Power School in Idaho Falls. His submarine duty included *USS Ethan Allen* (SSBN 608), and later as an Instructor at a Submarine Prototype School. He then separated from the Navy. He worked as a nuclear engineer for Pacific Gas & Electric in San Francisco, CA until retirement. In 2012, he moved to The Villages, FL to enjoy retirement in a golfing community, where he proudly drove his Naval Academy themed golf cart. Additionally, was a member of The Villages Aquatic Swim Team. Doug was also a true New Englander sports fan and was very proud to wear his Red Sox or Patriots shoes.

Doug is survived by his daughters Shawna Murphy and her mother Jill Gallant; daughter Lisa Murphy and her mother Marie Gaynor Murphy; and, his fiancé, Becky Windle.
