Michael McGrath Duran, Sr., died on September 5, 2022. He attended the Naval Academy entering with the now 3rd Company and left at the end of our first

Doug spent his childhood in Texarkana, Arkansas, graduating from Arkansas High School in 1967. He spent one year at USNA and time at sea, where he determined that was not life for him. He then joined the Air Force and spent some time in the Philippines determining weather conditions for flights into Vietnam. His first marriage gave him his wonderful son, Kevin.

George Perkins passed away this January in Linthicum Heights, Maryland from complications of Parkinson's disease. He was 78 years old.

George graduated out of 24th Company where he was not only known as "Bubba" but also for his prowess on the soccer field playing in the Brigade Championship game and victory. He was not only the Company Honor rep but also the Vice Chairman of the Brigade Honor Board.

Following graduation, George entered the Surface Navy, retiring as a CDR in 1992. A 21-year veteran, with service in Vietnam, he was diagnosed with heart disease, dementia and Parkinsons which resulted in his becoming a VA 100% disabled Vet due to his exposure to agent orange.

He is survived by his widow, Ruth, and their two children and five grandchildren. A celebration of life or other services may be held this spring. Also, the family is planning on cremation and inurnment at Arlington Cemetery. You will be notified when these dates are confirmed.

William G. Nielsen, of Glen Allen VA, passed away on January 16, 2026. He was born on April 15, 1948 in New York and he grew up in Rutherford, New Jersey. Survivors include his wife Judie, daughter Robyn, son Christopher, stepdaughters Stephanie and Sarah, sister Kirsten and brother Eric. He was pre-
